Joy of Cranleigh Joy Horn brings some anecdotes of 100 years ago

What was happening in Cranleigh in February 1916?

onscription, introduced in January, was beginning to bite. All fit single men between 18 and 41 were called up. The Rector wrote: 'we have very few men of military age left in the village, and those that are here have been attested and wear their armbands'.

Farms, shops and industries soon began to suffer from the loss of manpower. Several employers took their case to the 'Hambledon Appeals Tribunal', which began to meet each week at the Guildhall in Guildford. One Cranleigh farmer applied for exemption from service for his two sons, as two of his six thrashing engines were lying idle. He had plenty of work, year-round, but could not get drivers. The sons were granted exemption, but only for one month. Another farmer secured exemption for his son as there was only one other man to work a farm of 60 acres.


As a partial remedy for this labour shortage, the Surrey Education Committee convened a meeting of farmers at the Lion Hotel in Guildford and a spokesman agreed that if a boy had the prospect of work on a farm he might leave school at 13 instead of 14. However, when he suggested that the boy should be paid seven shil-

lings a week, there was a chorus from the farmers of 'Not me!'

In early February the Surrey Advertiser reported that the Church Lads' Brigade had ceased to exist in Cranleigh, because 40 members had left to serve in the forces. The next week, though, this report was strenuously denied. The Cranleigh Church Lads' Brigade was 'very much alive' under 2nd Lt. Harold Winser. His bakery and tearoom was in Kent House, where Barnardo's now is. He ran a coal business as well in the vard behind!

News came of the deaths of further Cranleigh men. Harold Frank Swallow, aged 19, of the 7th Battalion, The Queen's regiment, who lived in Bookhurst Hill, was killed instantly by a shell on 3rd of February in the trenches near the river Ancre. He left a wife, Katie, and a baby son, Frank, of five months, whom he had never seen. Harold's father had founded the Bookhurst Pottery (later known as 'Swallow's Tiles'), and before the War Harold had been a 'clay worker' in the family business.

Private James Surman of the 1st Battalion, The

Queen's regiment, was killed on 14th of February on the Western Front, at Annezin near Béthune, aged 22. The dreaded telegram was delivered to his home next door to the Cricketfield Stores on the Common (to the left of this photo, and out of sight). Before the war he had been a barber.

Catching up with Simon is a lot easier nowadays

Model and trainer.

rom an early age Simon Smith loved sport, from tennis in the back garden, dreaming of a Wimbledon final, to football on a patch of grass in front of his house, dreaming of playing for Arsenal.

He 'saw the light' aged 11 after starting rugby at Gowerton Grammar School in Wales. He wanted to play at Cardiff Arms Park, though not for Wales - for England! His English father had watched his national team lose to Wales throughout the 70's when Wales were invincible.

Starting as a scrum half and moving through all the back line positions, Simon settled on the wing and was fortunate to play in 2 winning Cambridge University sides at Twickenham in the early 80's.

His big break was playing for the Barbarians as the uncapped player in 1984 against the touring Australian team who had beaten all the home nations. He played against David Campese, and scored a try in a thrilling game resulting in a 37-31 win to Australia.

Playing club rugby for Wasps with other English internationals, a first cap was won against Romania, a try scoring debut, followed by 8 consecutive games and another 2 tries.

Going to New Zealand on tour, he admits the Haka was a daunting spectacle to face before playing! He was lucky to stop playing before Jonah Lomu came onto the scene.

Playing in the amateur era, he went on rugby tours all over the world including Australia, New Zealand, Japan, US and Romania.

He came to Cranleigh in 1995 with his family as an Economics teacher and rugby coach. Needless to say, he has more passion for sport than economics!


He retrained as a personal trainer in 2003. His work ranges from training teenagers, keen to improve their sprinting speed, to adults recovering from illness or injury. He also caters to those of us that simply want to

Simon scoring a try against Scotland at Twickenham







he Greenfinch, that chirpy House Sparrow sized-visitor to the garden and bird table, is in trouble.

I was seeing up to 140 in flocks around farms in the Cranleigh area only 18 years ago. And until recent times this tubby songster put in daily winter appearances for just about everybody who cared to feed it. As we moved into the turn of the century I regarded its status as an abundant resident, winter visitor and passage migrant — although even then I was noting its numbers appeared to be falling.

But it has been more recently harshly clobbered by something rather nasty that's been lurking around our feeding stations in the last decade – and I don't mean the abundant cat population.

Greenfinch numbers have been steadily plummeting since the disease known as Finch trichomonosis, caused by a protozoal parasite called Trichomonas gallinae, was first identified as a worry for our perching birds in 2005.

Since then there has been a steady decline nationally and locally. If you are still seeing or hearing

them regularly near you then you are an exception. It will be interesting to see the results of a concerted effort among Cranleigh bird watchers to survey their gardens over the weekend of 30-31 January for the RSPB's annual Big Garden Birdwatch.

Nationally last year the Greenfinch dropped from 15th most common bird in the 2014 survey to 25th – a huge fall.

As I write, if early records from a number of local birders this year are anything to go by, then the species will I fear have crashed even further from its one-time perch in the top 10.

Until 2011, I always saw Greenfinch on the first day of the year and it was sometimes my first or second bird for January 1 – the day when keen birders are always eager to make an early start on their latest year list.

But as I neared the end of the first week of 2016 I hadn't seen or heard even a 'wheeze' from a Greenfinch, even though I'd seen 72 other species. And a birding gardener friend of mine told me he saw over 80 species this year before eventually 'clocking' just

one single bird that eventually flew overhead.

Finch trichomonosis is a stinker and it has hit other species too, including the Chaffinch. I have seen them with grossly deformed feet, or even no feet at all. Affected birds may show signs of lethargy, fluffed-up plumage, breathing difficulties, and wet plumage around the bill.

It is estimated there has been an annual rate of decline of the breeding Greenfinch population within England of at least 7 per cent since the initial epidemic

Do your bit to fight back by following British Trust for Ornithology (BTO) advice to routinely take sensible hygiene precautions if handling bird feeders and tables: 'Clean and disinfect feeders and feeding sites regularly. Suitable disinfectants that can be used include a weak solution of domestic bleach (5% sodium hypochlorite) or other specially-designed commercial products.'

Rinse feeders thoroughly, air-dry before re-use, and clean bird baths daily. Rotating feeder positions can also help prevent the build-up of contamination in any one area of ground below your feeders.







BOOK **REVIEW**

Simon Scarrow's **Under the Eagle** series.

The Under the Eagle series revolves around the son of a freed imperial slave from Rome, who is sent to Germania after his father's death. Young Cato is portrayed as a smart, yet shy and insecure man, who befriends the veteran Centurion Macro, who is, as a character, a stark contrast to our brainy protagonist.

In this story of friendship through war and hardship, the relationship between the two soldiers blossoms into an unbreakable brotherhood. It is a friendship that the reader can genuinely feel a part of.


The series essentially begins with the second Roman invasion of Brittania, under Emperor Claudius. Aiming to succeed where the notorious General Julius Caesar had failed a century ago, the Romans battle their way up from the south coast of the foggy and mysterious Island.

The books then follow the two friends, as they are sent from one corner of the empire. From fighting the Druids under rebel leader Caractacus, to quashing a slave rebellion on the Island of Crete, Macro and Cato's friendship grows throughout their battles.

The battles and skirmishes in which Scarrow places our two heroes, are brilliantly drawn from real life events. One particular battle was won as a small Roman force flanked the British 'barbarians' by crossing a river upstream. You guessed right, Cato and Macro are part of that small force.

Former History teacher turned author, Scarrow uses his knowledge of battles and history expertly. He has a tradition of visiting each site before depicting it in his books, which he uses to great avail, allowing the reader to envisage their own image of events within a realistic geographical context.



A HELP TO PASSING EXAMS - without cheating!

ne of my tutors at college gave me this advice, which revolutionised my method of studying. It could be called "The Family Tree System". Previously, I used to sit in an armchair with a textbook to read, which usually resulted in falling to sleep! Instead, you need to sit at a table on an upright chair with a stack of A4 paper.

Place one sheet of paper in front of you with the long side facing you and the text book beside. Study the book one chapter at a time with the chapter title written at the top of the page. Then subdivide the subiect under different headings and write them down as the "children" in the family tree. As you read further details, subdivide those headings as the "grandchildren". Use another sheet for the next chapter until you finish the book and have the gist of the subject at your fingertips. Before I adopted this method, I would remember certain details but didn't have an overall view of the subject. This system can be adapted to many different academic subjects. 

t was March, warm and blue, with a crisp gust that is so unmistakably Brighton. Even after all these years, a certain scent in the air, a glint of light, and I'm back there, walking towards the famous promenade, towards that place famous only to a few. Seagulls screaming overhead, and in the distance, a carousel melody playing above the gentle white noise of waves on the shore. I crossed the main road, turning right, from my flat in Kemp Town, towards the centre. Rollercoaster capsules swooped and fell in the distance, tiny people teeming like ants around the entrance to the pier. The smell of doughnuts, chips and vinegar. Salt.

I dodged couples walking hand in hand, cyclists scowling at daytrippers wandering into the cycle lane, barefoot hippies selling beaded bracelets and henna tattoos. Down the ramp onto the lower promenade, the carousel music competing with bass beats from inside the bars that ran along the front. Women with enormous sunglasses and miniature dogs, squealing kids running between legs, large elderly couples waddling with ice cream cones in hand.

Then, just ahead, The Fortune. Pub benches crammed with laughing groups of friends, staff in olive green tshirts carrying towers of empty glasses. And The Rolling Stones, blaring out into the chaos. This was my destination.

The manager's name was Arun, an Asian guy in his late twenties from up north, and when I arrived they put an arm round my shoulders and led me to him. He took one look at me, eighteen, skinny, bright eyed and grinning from ear to ear, and said, "Can you start tomorrow?"

Nothing could have prepared me for my first day of work. The sheer pace of it, the anarchic buzz of a bar where the drinkers just kept on coming. Eight men deep from 11am; no rest. My trainers saturated in beer, my hair sticky with Sambuca, and my heart beating like a drum. It was a very sudden jolt into the world, my first job. drenched in adrenalin and laughter.

My shift ended at six, with a word in my ear to just drop everything and go, or I'd be there all evening too. I followed my new co-workers out onto the beach, and sat cross-legged on the pebbles, watching starlings in murmuration over the wreck of the West Pier. There's a photograph somewhere, of us all watching it together.

There are loads of photographs from that year. We were all less than 21, all overwhelmed by the new freedom stretching out forever ahead of us. Every day was like that first day, relentless, exquisitely joyful, completely without any responsibility beyond making it behind the bar when the rota said so. The year I spent at The Fortune was the best of my life.

Most of us have children now; wives, husbands, partners. We own homes, pay mortgages, and would rather go for a guiet coffee than five beers, two shots and a nightclub. But the bond we formed back then binds us still, in mutual love and respect for the people we have each become.

I watched as my wild, young rebels became professors, pharmacists, journalists, working artists. We moved away from the city by the sea, we moved back. We moved away again. We learned to be there for each other, from towns, cities, countries, and sometimes continents away. I, too, grew into the person I always hoped to be, despite the odds. Despite our parents' despair that we were wasting away our lives on frivolous fun, when the future was so hard ahead.

None of us would ever have guessed the challenges life had in store. It was all so easy then, and we had no reason to expect things would ever change. We were different, of course. We knew it all, and how to live better than all those who came before us. Until, that is, we didn't. But with each new hurdle, we taught each other how to grow, and which direction to choose. We learned from each other's mistakes, and we stood by holding back the tide when tsunamis of life's terrors threatened to engulf each of us in turn.

I often wonder if we would be friends if we met each other now. Who can say? Knowing them as well as I do, I know how alike we are as much as how we differ. After all, it can't be just that shared past that keeps us close, can it?

Some have gone their own way, either by dint of their choices, or because they're not the people we thought they were. So, of those that are left, I suppose there must be something solid there that transcends our history. But how would we know that, without that history as our anchor?

How many friends are there out in the world we've yet to meet, or who we haven't yet given the time? Perhaps there's a Fortune crew out there for every one of us. Long lasting love may be just a conversation away, and sewn in over years to come.

Tête-à-Tête

RECIPES



Ingredients

2 Chicken breasts (2 x 150 g washed and dried) 80g stuffing (see below)

4 slices Parma ham, cut thin

50ml double cream

25ml dry Marsala (or sherry)

100ml strong chicken stock

200g mirepoix cut small (onion, celery, carrot, bayleaf) 25g butter with a little oil

Salt and pepper

The Stuffing

40g of good salami

2 dry figs, soaked overnight – cover with hot water and leave

Make a fine paste of the two ingredients using a blender or if you are a 'traditionalist' – chop, chop and . . . chop!!

Method

 make an incision in thin part of the breast to form a pouch in it and place half stuffing in each and season

- in a frying pan seal the chicken until slightly coloured, set aside
- 3. in the same fat, fry the mirepoix
- pour a little oil well distributed, onto an oven (metal) tray
- 5. **place** the mirepoix in it and the chicken on top
- 6. place the tray in preheated oven, 180°C for 25min.
- 7. take the chicken out and keep it hot
- 8. **reheat** the mirepoix and pour over the Marsala, the stock and reduce by half.
- strain into suitably sized saucepan and season to taste
- add the cream and bring to temperature but do not boil
- 11. if necessary thicken with a little diluted cornflour
- 12. **place** the two chicken breasts side by side on a suitable, warmed plate and trim to form a heart
- pour half the sauce over it, decorate to taste and serve

Tiramisu` for Two

15 sponge finger biscuits 50g of Mascarpone 50g of Ricotta

2fl oz double cream

1 freshly laid large egg (be sure of its provenance) 25g soft light brown sugar

15g caster sugar

20ml of Rum or Brandy (Tia Maria is recommended)

1 medium cup of strong coffee

15g cocoa powder

2 large strawberries

Using 3 Bowls, one of which should be 1litre capacity.

- Separate the egg, put yolk in the larger bowl
- Add soft brown sugar to the yolks and whisk until very light in colour to make quite a stiff mixture.
- Add Mascarpone and Ricotta, whisking together to form a smooth paste. It must not drop off the whisk.
- Whisk egg whites (make sure the whisk is REALLY clean, otherwise the whites do not stiffen) and add a little castor sugar when forming peaks. Add this to the first mixture.
- Whip the cream and also add it to the first mix. Refrigerate.



Prepare a rectangular dish by sprinkling some caster sugar in it.

- Place 5 sponge fingers on the dish, sugared side up.
 Soak with coffee and liqueur
- Cover the sponge fingers with some of the creamy mixture.
- Repeat this 2 more times using 5 sponge fingers each time, dividing creamy mixture equally.
- Place strawberries cut vertically on top to form little hearts.
- Just before serving sprinkle the cocoa powder over the Tiramisu`.





Just Say The Word

n the English language, the use of the word 'love' ap plies to a range of feelings and experiences. From the love of a partner, to the love of your children, of friends, of your country, of God, and even the love of a nice roast dinner! In a world where the art of coffee has such a sophisticated vocabulary... surely the art of love deserves much more?

The ancient Greeks had a more diverse set of definitions for the kinds of love it is possible for a person to experience. They actually had around thirty different words to describe love, in all its many incarnations. Let's take a look at some of the most widely recognised forms of love, as identified by the ancient Greeks.

Eros

Though Eros stems from natural sexual urges and lusts, it is a state of the heart. Sex can lead to children, family, joy and laughter, but without Eros, these things cannot be sustained. When Eros is infused and elevated to its true position, it can be spiritual, even transcendental. A relationship founded with plenty of Eros, can transcend into Pragma (the deeper, long-standing, compromise and sacrifice of long-term love), and to Agape.

Ludos

Eros is often preceded by Ludos, a playful, flirtatious affection, which can evolve into romance. Ludos, however, is not necessarily just flirtatious, but is also embodied in fun – such as going dancing, or a night's enjoyment with friends. It may seem superficial, compared to some of the other kinds of love we are looking at here, but maybe we could all do with a little more Ludos in our lives.

Philea

Philea is easy love and affection, and embodies our culture and beliefs. It's about the emotion we feel towards people like ourselves, or to those with whom we hold a shared goal. For teams, communities, peer groups, co-workers and so on. Philea can be combined with Storge, and is demonstrated through loyalty, sacrifice and the sharing of confidences.

Storge

This is the love of community and family. It is a natural love, but powerful enough to be a hindrance to spiritual growth, in circumstances where family and culture have a negative effect on your life. To understand Storge is to understand the complexities surrounding our duties and obligations, as much as to appreciate and elevate the emotion at the heart of them, in a more meaningful way.

Agape

Agape, the love of humanity, is the glue that holds the other loves together and gives us the wisdom and patience when other loves fail. Agape may be defined as pleasure in the object of affection, of prizing it above all other things, be unwilling to abandon it or do without it. Agape puts the beloved first and sacrifices pride, self-interest and possessions for the sake of that beloved. This is the love that God has for us. It is the kind of love we are commanded to have for one another, a love of supreme greatness.

Philautia

This is a love which many of us sometimes forget to maintain. It is love for ourselves, the joy of being true to our own values, to caring for ourselves and practising self-compassion. To embrace True Philautia is not vain or selfish: quite the contrary. It is only through loving ourselves that we can truly embrace and experience other loves. As Aristotle puts it: "All friendly feelings for others are an extension of a man's feelings for himself".

Looking at the ways that the ancient Greeks segmented the general idea of love, may give some food for thought as to how to enhance our own experiences, and maybe, humanity as a whole. As we look to the annual celebration of Valentine's Day, let's take some time to reflect on love in all its forms, and how a deeper understanding of the word and its application can enrich our lives, and the lives of those around us.
